Greetings from our new Pastor Fr Jim Berning - Part 4

What was the transition from employment with Dowell Chemical to the Salesians like?

When I graduated from university, I was hired by Dowell Chemical as a field engineering representative. The line of work was both exhilarating and satisfying, and having transferred three times with the oilfield service company for two years, I continued to pursue the vocation promptings which brought me into contact with a number of diocesan and religious priests, religious sisters and lay leaders. While working in Ohio, I met a transitional deacon named Fr. Dennis Donovan, who later that year was ordained a Salesian priest. We enjoyed a long brunch after mass one Sunday and he filled me about the charism of St. John Bosco as well as the intercessory role of Mary as Help of Christians. I stayed in contact with Dennis and various vocation directors. Eventually I visited Salesian summer camps, their formation house, and subsequently resigned from Dowell Chemical and began teaching grade 10 English at a Salesian school in New Orleans, Louisiana. The year was one of great adjustment since I was living in community and had not been trained as an educator, but with the hearty school and satisfying community life, I found the overall experience to be akin to what I had discerned. The next year I went to the Salesian formation house, and later that year in 1985, I made my first profession as a Salesian.
